Dear Brothers and Sisters,

During this time of Advent, I send one and all, greetings and prayers from our beloved St. Stephen of Hungary Mission Church in Chicago's West Town neighborhood.

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas this year and conclude 2025, I am reminded of these words, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 15:13).

Recently, I was in Rome for the Jubilee Year 2025 when Chicago's own Pope Leo XIV invited pilgrims to celebrate, receive and share the gift of hope. His predecessor Pope Benedict XVI once wrote, "The one who has hope lives differently; the one who hopes has been granted the gift of a new life (Spe Salvi, No.2).

In challenging times when our global situation seems bleak, we call to mind during this holy season that God sends us hope for the light came into the world at the birth of our Savior in Bethlehem.

Here at St. Stephen of Hungary Mission we are a hopeful people and wish to celebrate with you this hope this upcoming Christmas whether you can join us, or are away. Above all, you are in our hearts and prayers.
